Measles screening Questions

Children who are greater than 1 year of age

- Does your child have a fever or rash?
 - o If YES ask: Is your child up to date on their routine shots/vaccines?
 - If child is up to date on routine vaccination, no action is needed.
 - If child is NOT up to date on routine vaccination, place patient in private room (airborne infection isolation room if available) and assess for measles. Follow your local health department recommendations.
- Has your child been exposed to measles?
- Did you or anyone in your household travel in the last month?

Children who are less-than or equal to 1 year of age

- Does your child have a fever or rash?
 - If YES, place patient in private room (airborne infection isolation if available) and asses for measles.
- Has your child been exposed to measles?
- Did you or anyone in your household travel in the last month?

REMINDERS:

If a patient is vaccinated, a measles diagnosis is highly unlikely!

Many unvaccinated children who have a fever and rash will <u>not</u> have measles; assess for alternative diagnoses if measles is epidemiologically unlikely.

Do not refer patients to the Emergency Room or Urgent Care for testing only.

If a patient needs to be referred for testing or clinical evaluation, notify the facility prior to the patient's arrival.
